Colleagues from Bor take part in our international weeks and conferences MEB and FIKUSZ traditionally, I might say. Now I was visiting University of Belgrade, Technical Faculty in Bor within the Erasmus+ Credit Mobility Program between 23 and 27 May to strengthen our already good relationships.



As I had never been in Serbia previously I was a little bit (or more) curious about the university, the students, the country. This week was wonderful! My Ivan Mihajlovic hosts, and Djordje Nikolic different programs, had organized a lot of only interesting not instructive ones.
